Rockt launch successful

One of our new projects for 2023 has lifted off. The new business is called Rockt. It is an innovative app, a mobile platform that connects employers and job seekers in a fast and easy way. Rockt was launched with the help of Foundation Broken Hill.

It is different from other job apps because it allows users to create their own profiles, similar to social media platforms. This way, employers can showcase their work cultures and values, and job seekers can highlight their skills and experience without writing long cover letters.

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Record recipients for Training Grant

A record number of people has been allocated grants in the 2023 Foundation Broken Hill-Skillshare Training Program.

The Foundation doubled the amount of

funding for the program, making \$10,000 available with up to \$1,000 allocated to each successful applicant and broadened the promotion to attract people who were looking to gain or upgrade skills and qualifications in trade fields rather than only tertiary study.

A field of 16 applicants was reviewed by a selection panel of Foundation Deputy Chair Chris Dougherty, Directors Lindy Molesworth and Kevin Taylor, along with former Skillshare Manager Pam Clarke and Foundation CEO Travis Nadge and Admin Assistant Kirsty Murray.

Ultimately 10 people have been awarded \$1,000 grants in a good mix of trade apprenticeships, health and teaching.

The age range of applicants was also broad—from 16 to 36.

These grants can be spent on requirements such as course fees, equipment, travel expenses, textbooks—anything that will help someone achieve their qualifications.

The Foundation Broken Hill-

Skillshare Training Grant was established in 2013 using income generated from funds endowed to the Foundation when Skillshare closed in 2012. By 2017 it was expanded to include support for financially disadvantaged school leavers seeking tertiary education as well as the initial concept of assisting local jobseekers or casual workers to develop new skills and qualifications to break into different career paths.

To date almost \$60,000 has been awarded through the program.

A word from Travis...

It has been very encouraging over the last 12 months to see the response to our interest free small business loan program. During and after the covid period it was very quiet with no approaches from small business for this program.

In the last year we have now approved six loans totalling around \$150,000.

The reasons behind these loans have varied from start-up support to expanding existing business offerings.

These local small businesses will pay back their loans over the next couple of years, allowing us to re-inject our project money back into other businesses locally, continuing this program indefinitely.

It has been encouraging to see this increased activity in small business locally and the positive approach these business owners have, not only to their own business but also to opportunities for business in Broken Hill.

Foundation Broken Hill: How it works...

Foundation Broken Hill facilitates employment opportunities and encourages social development in Broken Hill and the surrounding region.

Its core function is to help Broken Hill create sustainable alternative businesses to build our local economy.

The Foundation Board comprises a set of highly skilled people with diverse expertise, who give their time voluntarily for community benefit. We do this by:

1. Raising capital funds... through fundraising campaigns which seek donations from current and former Broken Hill residents, local businesses, broader industry and governments,

- 2. Recognising contributions... through a structured Friends of the Foundation pyramid at Platinum, Gold, Silver and Zinc levels, with opportunity for smaller once-only donations too,
- Investing the capital... where your gift is held in perpetuity but generates interest to be used for approved projects—or an option where your gift is held in a Project Fund to be channelled directly into assessed projects at the discretion of the Board,
- 4. Carefully assessing applications for funding support... through a thorough process that includes review of documentation, business planning assessments, face-toface discussion and site visits where relevant,
- 5. Providing support... in appropriate forms, which can include once-only small grants or larger interest-free loans repayable over a longer term with flexible sustainable payment plans and some 'breathing space' for new or emerging businesses, and

6. Monitoring and reviewing...

businesses who have received support to identify whether additional assistance is required, including mentoring.

Foundation Broken Hill has been operating in the local community for more than 22 years and is now sustainable in its own right.

It needs support to grow the Capital and Project Funds so it can increase more meaningful contributions to the community.
