Superior Light Abstract Gallery "SLAG Heap Projects"

SLAG Heap Projects is the newest art gallery in Broken Hill and it aims to showcase the diverse and vibrant works of local artists in Far West NSW and Foundation Broken Hill is proud to be a supporter.

The gallery, which opened its doors on the 1st of December, is located at Shop 5, 217 Oxide St and is operated by founding co-directors Asma Mather, Verity Nunan and Hestor Lyon.

The art gallery was born out of conversations and field trips on Wilyakali and Barkindji Country. Walking in creek beds, following mulga parrots and tracks brought the artists together.

The name SLAG Heap Projects is a nod to the history of the area, as well as a metaphor for the artistic process of transforming raw materials into something beautiful.

The gallery will feature a range of exhibitions, workshops and events from a broad spectrum of local artists and will cater to different audiences.

The opening of the new gallery was very well received with 30 plus artists and locals attending.

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History of the Line of Lode

The Line of Lode is an ore body that bisects the town of Broken Hill.


When a German born boundary rider found what he thought to be a piece of tin while mustering sheep on an outback station 140 years ago, he had no idea how significant his find would be.

It was September 5, 1883 and that piece of tin in western NSW was actually silver and lead.

The boundary rider, Charles Rasp, had found what would be known as the Line of Lode—a massive ore body. This discovery led to the town of Broken Hill sprouting from the red dirt.

The Miner's Memorial is a symbolic representation of the human tragedy. More than 800 miners have died on the job since 1883, leaving behind a legacy of courage, sacrifice and resilience.

It's a dramatic, spiritual and iconic structure on the edge of the mullock heap, and is a reminder of the human cost of mining. It is dedicated to those who gave the ultimate sacrifice to the city of Broken Hill and its surrounds. The memorial itself is a metaphor for the miners, evoking the damp, claustrophobic underground environment. Glass panels bear the names and dates of death of each miner who perished.





A word from the Chair


This year was indeed a period of great excitement for Foundation Broken Hill as we saw some of our larger projects slowly progress and see some light.

Foundation Broken Hill: How it works...

Foundation Broken Hill facilitates employment opportunities and encourages social development in Broken Hill and the surrounding region.

Its core function is to help Broken Hill create sustainable alternative businesses to build our local economy.

The Foundation Board comprises a set of highly skilled people with diverse expertise, who give their time voluntarily for community benefit. We do this by:

- Raising capital funds... through fundraising campaigns which seek donations from current and former Broken Hill residents, local businesses, broader industry and governments,
- 2. Recognising contributions...

- through a structured Friends of the Foundation pyramid at Platinum, Gold, Silver and Zinc levels, with opportunity for smaller once-only donations too,
- 3. Investing the capital... where your gift is held in perpetuity but generates interest to be used for approved projects—or an option where your gift is held in a Project Fund to be channelled directly into assessed projects at the discretion of the Board,
- 4. Carefully assessing applications for funding support... through a thorough process that includes review of documentation, business planning assessments, face-to-face discussion and site visits where relevant,
- 5. Providing support... in appropriate forms, which can include once-only small grants or larger interest-free loans repayable over a longer term with flexible sustainable payment plans and some 'breathing space' for new or emerging businesses, and
- Monitoring and reviewing...
 businesses who have received
 support to identify whether
 additional assistance is required,
 including mentoring.

Foundation Broken Hill has been operating in the local community for more than 22 years and is now sustainable in its own right.

It needs support to grow the Capital and Project Funds so it can increase more meaningful contributions to the community.
